

NAFFA 2017 Annual Report



It is my pleasure to present the Native American Fatherhood and Families Association's 2017 Annual Report. This year was a very busy and successful one for NAFFA. With over 1100 trained facilitators and over 200 tribes and tribal agencies offering our curricula, we are proud of what we have been able to accomplish in improving the lives of fathers, mothers and children across the US and beyond.

Overview of NAFFA

Established in 2002, Native American Fatherhood & Families Association (NAFFA) works with over 200 tribes across the country and has trained over 1100 certified facilitators who are helping approximately 20,000 fathers and mothers with limited assistance from federal or state funds.

It is the goal of NAFFA to create a synergistic environment and deliver information in the form of sessions, keynotes, presentations, seminars, professional training and social engagements that showcase and address the most recent information relating to building strong families and healthy communities.

Based in Arizona, NAFFA provides programs to strengthen Native American families through responsible fatherhood and motherhood. These unique programs create a passion in parents to take a leadership role in keeping families happy and safe. Through their programs' success, NAFFA has found that their purpose and methods extend to people of all ages, cultures, and backgrounds.

The **Fatherhood Is Sacred, Motherhood Is Sacred** program was created and designed for fathers and mothers using a Native American approach. The goal of the program is to strengthen families through responsible parenting. NAFFA teaches parents to connect with their heritage as they become actively involved in the lives of their families.

The goal of **Linking Generations by Strengthening Relationships** (LGSR) course is to assist fathers, mothers and families to enhance their capacity to engage and maintain healthy relationships, such as married couples, adult siblings, co-parenting and children within the family. This three-day course offers participants with the opportunity to learn the truths and myths of strong, healthy positive relationships. It builds upon NAFFA's Fatherhood is Sacred and Motherhood is Sacred program and works to assist parents in regaining a sense of self-worth, understanding and healing.

For those interested in seeking college credit, FIS/MIS participants and facilitators may earn college credit toward a BA degree from Wilkes University upon completion of the program. Please contact our office for additional details.

Move to Larger Office

As NAFFA continues to grow our programs and curricula, we moved our offices to a larger space in Mesa in March. We now have adequate space to provide training on site and house our growing staff and interns. To publicize our new space and promote our expanding programs, we sponsored an Open House on May 23 and saw a great turnout.

Overview of NAFFA's Impact

Seminars

Our seminars provide a chance for an organization to bring in Mr. Pooley for a one-day presentation about how to strengthen families in Native American communities.

In 2017, NAFFA sponsored three seminars in Polson Montana, Baltimore Maryland and Mesa Arizona.

On May 1, 2017, the Johns Hopkins Center for American Indian Health (JHCAIH), the Native American Father and Families Association (NAFFA), and Casey Family Programs convened a daylong national symposium entitled, *Engaging the Strength of Family to Promote Lifelong Health: Lessons from the First Americans* at the Johns Hopkins School of Public Health in Baltimore, Maryland.

The conference was designed to share effective family-based strategies for improved individual and community health and well-being. It featured expert researchers and practitioners from across North America including indigenous health leaders, representatives from top academic institutions dedicated to Native health, and Indian Health Service leadership.

The speakers outlined the constellation of public health issues facing tribal communities today and presented comprehensive, evidence-based family-based interventions, policies, and systems of care to renew Native health and well-being.



United Nations Meeting

In March 2017 NAFFA was asked to attend the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (CSW). The theme for 2017 was Women's Economic Empowerment in the Changing World of Work. NAFFA representative met many Non-Governmental Organizations (NGO's) and foreign Ambassadors during our visit.

In March 2018 NAFFA will be presenting at the United Nations CSW with the theme focused upon Women in the Rural Setting. At this event we will have fathers and mothers who are in the Fatherhood Is Sacred™/Motherhood Is Sacred™ programs be present to share with the world our Native culture and viewpoints on the importance and sacredness of fatherhood, motherhood, and families.



Teen Parent Conference

NAFFA sponsored our second National Teen & Young Parent Conference on June 8 & 9 in Mesa, Arizona. The theme was on Leadership, Education, Awareness and Diversity (LEAD). It was a great opportunity for attendees to meet other Native American youth from across the country. The conference consisted of 16 workshops in Leadership, Education, Awareness and Parenting with powerful keynote speakers. There were also several fun activities for the youth to be involved in throughout the two-day conference.



Fifth Annual Native American Responsible Fatherhood Day

NAFFA initiated a Fatherhood Is Sacred™, Motherhood Is Sacred™ group meeting at our Mesa office on Wednesday evenings beginning July 5. While the group has focused

upon participants on parole, others are also welcome to attend. Participants may start on any Wednesday and attend 12 sessions to receive a certificate of completion.

2017 Annual Conference: November 1 through 3

NAFFA's 14th Annual "Fatherhood is Leadership" National Conference was a great success. We had over 175 attend representing 36 tribes from across the US. The conference offered four keynote presentations, 16 break out workshops, an update and training for the 38 facilitators in attendance, testimonials by graduates of FIS/MIS and LGSR groups, all wrapped up with a fry bread lunch outdoors. We received consistently positive evaluations about the facility, the staff, We Ko Pa Resort at Fort McDowell, as well as the content of the workshops and key note presenters.

Certified Facilitator Training

NAFFA is increasing the number of certified FIS/MIS trainers to help with the expansion of our programs and services across the US and Canada. When we are invited by a tribal organization to bring the FIS/MIS or LGSR facilitator training to their community, we ask that they recruit a minimum of ten people to attend the three-day session. Most of these are presented by our president, Albert Pooley. But, due to the increasing number of requests, we now have two other certified facilitators who provide the training.

Coming in 2018

As NAFFA continues to expand our horizons, we plan to implement several objectives in the New Year. These include:

Expand our programs throughout the ten provinces and three territories in Canada.

Offer the curricula to more non-Native communities.

Recruit more facilitators that work in the criminal justice field to sponsor groups in probation, parole, prisons, jails and reintegration efforts.

Begin offering facilitator training in Addressing Family Violence and Abuse. (See below)

New Curriculum

NAFFA will be offering a third curriculum that will train facilitators to grow happy and safe families in their communities. On April 17 to 19, Mr. Pooley will present Addressing Family Violence and Abuse at our Mesa office.

Addressing Family Violence and Abuse is a 12 session program that was created to provide a more in-depth and focused resource for families and communities facing this devastating problem. The three-day training defines domestic violence and abuse, identifies contributing factors, and provides ways to overcome the effects of abuse and much more. This program offers hope and healing to individuals caught in the cycle of abuse and violence.

New Project

NAFFA is implementing the Native American Fatherhood Initiative, a multi-pronged approach to enhance and coordinate the development and expansion of programs and services for Native American fathers and men in families in communities across the US.

Announced as a pilot project at our annual conference in November, NAFFA seeks to recruit three communities in 2018 to sponsor the initiative for the fathers and families on their reservations. We propose that a group of NAFFA certified facilitators, interested parents, tribal council members and local service providers establish a coordinating committee to bring together individuals with the shared interest in expanding opportunities for fathers to receive educational, employment, legal and social supports in their community. Tribal representatives from family courts, behavioral health, TANF, juvenile justice, Head Start, child protection, social services, foster care, education, housing, domestic violence, child welfare and the tribal council may be invited to offer their recommendations and support this four step process. These include:

1. Coordinate a needs assessment process to identify unmet needs of local fathers seeking assistance. NAFFA will supply the assessment tool for service providers to distribute and collect from local fathers. NAFFA will then compile this data and write a report.

2. The coordinating committee will identify potential service providers that might address the specific needs identified in an agency self- assessment tool such as family law assistance, affordable housing for fathers and children, family mediation, parent education, mentoring, anger management, assistance for fathers of children with special needs, co-parenting, custody evaluation, job placement, credit repair, family planning, paternity establishment, child care, and other related concerns.

3. NAFFA will then provide on-site consultation to help process and apply the results of steps one and two. In addition, NAFFA will provide training to staff of community service agencies and tribal government organizations on how to establish and maintain father-inclusive policies and practices and to create father-friendly environments.

4. The coordinating committee will recruit local parents and service providers to complete certified facilitator training in Fatherhood Is Sacred, Motherhood Is Sacred, Linking Generations by Strengthening Relationships and Addressing Family Violence and Abuse.

FIS/MIS Now Offered at Tribal Colleges

Two tribal colleges will begin teaching an undergraduate course on Fatherhood Is Sacred Motherhood Is Sacred in 2018. Stone Child College in Box Elder Montana and the Nebraska Indian Community College in Macy Nebraska will both start offering a three credit course beginning in January.
